

email from **ElectionBuddy Elect.** that you were sent around July 21st. If you don't see that email, check your spam area.



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
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Sunshine Region Election Biographies



President Nominee – Andy Zimmerman

Vice President Nominee – Mark Lewalski

I joined the NMRA as a Life member in 1998. In 2013 I actively joined the Sunshine Region and became Treasurer the following year. I ran for SSR Vice President a few years later, was elected, and served in that position. During my tenure as a Board Officer, I reestablished the SSR website by creating a new site from scratch and served as webmaster. I also created a new design and reestablished the monthly Telegraph Key email. I took on the Region IT aspects and conducted the first purchases of new laptops and accessories with funds from our SSR sponsored NMRA 2017 National Convention in Orlando. I started a Facebook page for the SSR and appointed an administrator. As my duties became more hectic, I passed on the Webmaster and IT Chair duties to other capable individuals, and I kept the Telegraph Key and VP duties. For personal reasons at the time, I stepped down from SSR VP and Telegraph Key duties after passing all my responsibilities to other members. I have recently been appointed SSR Vice President again and would like your vote to continue in that role.



Treasurer Nominee – Glenn Kopriva

Glenn has worn many hats during his career, starting off with a stint in law enforcement with the US Army. He completed his education with an AAS in Law Enforcement and BBA and MBA, he may finish his PhD one of these days.

Some of the positions held during his career have been Controller of two large pharmaceutical firms, Director of Business Intelligence, and Sr Associate with New York Life Insurance dealing with Fraud and data analysis for the US and Canada based out of the Tampa office.

Glenn joined the NMRA back in 1976 when the NMRA bulletin was all black and white. He built the HO Railroad that Grows based on Lynn Wescott's instructions in his parent's basement. A career ensued and the train was put into storage. Four children later and nearing retirement he has moved to N scale and has begun construction of an island layout (7x10) in half of his garage.

He has taken on numerous roles with the Sunshine Region (currently Treasurer, Convention Chair, and Webmaster – previously the Telegraph Key Editor and Membership Coordinator). He has also authored a few articles and was a clinician at the last convention.

As the current Treasurer, Glenn has opened up the books of the Region for full transparency and delivers full details to the Board each month along with a rolling 3 year budget. Glenn has also invested the Regions monies generating the region 1/3 of its annual budget. He has also reenvisioned the Regions advertising practices, lowering advertising costs and enhancing ad revenue which adds to the dollars needed to meet our fiscal requirements. These actions change how the region operates and allows us to focus on trains not fund raising. This benefits all our members.



Secretary Nominee – Eric Menger

Eric has been an NMRA and SSR member for many years, joining initially when he was a teenager. At that time, he used the NMRA Directory (a printed book mailed to members at the time) to contact local model railroaders. He was a founding member and newsletter editor (while in high school) of the Treasure Coast Model Railroad Club, which is still active in St. Lucie County, Florida. Eric graduated from high school and was appointed to the United States Naval Academy, so the model railroading came to an emergency stop. During his time in the US Navy, and then while serving as an airport manager, Eric started three HO layouts. However, he never completed them due to career moves, completing several tours as a Naval Reservist, raising 4 children, and concurrently running a busy airport (VRB). After retirement, Eric switched to O scale (On30) and joined Al Sohl's Western Bay Railroad Club in Port St Lucie, where he started working on his MMR certifications. He is currently serving the NMRA and SSR as Regional Secretary and the Eastern Division Achievement Program Chair. He has served as a contest judge and has given clinics on scenery using resin hardshell and rock molds.

Eric spent his active-duty career as a naval aviator and transitioned to the naval reserve in 1989. In the reserve, he served as a pilot and a naval intelligence officer, retiring from the Navy in 2007. He now works part-time as an aviation business development manager for a national civil engineering firm. Outside the NMRA, he has served as treasurer for the Veterans Council of Indian River County, treasurer for the local chapter of the Military Officer's Association of America, and Director, Secretary, Vice-President, and President of the Florida District of the National Exchange Club, a 501c(3) organization whose main focus is the prevention of child abuse. He and his family live in Vero Beach, Florida.



At Large Director Nominee – Paul Beckstrom

Currently serving as incumbent since 2022.

Model railroader for 60+ years. Have modeled in O, On3 & On30. Currently Protype Modeling in HO; Western Pacific RR – 1960's/70's

I am a team player. I am interested in providing whatever services are necessary to improve and assist in NMRA proceedings and ventures in the Sunshine Region.



At Large Director Nominee – Jeff "Ski" Guzowski

I grew up in Dania Beach, FL, where only 4 blocks from our house were the Florida East Coast Railway, double track mainline (with our own passenger station/freight house). Also, about a mile away, was the Atlantic Coastline, (then the Seaboard Airline / Seaboard Coastline) all within bike riding distance, (1950's &1960's). As a kid, I have always been interested in model railroading since I was 6 years old and I loved spending a lot of time with the Station Agent, watching trains that came through our town, and built 2 HO model layouts.

I rediscovered Model Railroading as a hobby in 2006, before I retired in 2009 (from AT&T as a Service Repair Technician). My newly built 30' x 40' outbuilding (my "new" train room) will be completed any day now. I can't wait to start building my new layout, modeling the Norfolk and Western Steam Era (1943) Shenandoah Division (Roanoke, VA to Hagerstown, MD) in HO.

I am currently a member of the Operations Special Interest Group (OPSIG), Layout Design Special Interest Group (LDSIG), Echoes Train Club (Cutler Bay, FL), Citrus Model Railroad Club (Inverness, FL), Norfolk Western Historical Society, and Florida East Coast Railway Society.

I joined the NMRA in 2007 and was appointed to the positions of Southern Division Asst Superintendent (mid 2008-2010) and Southern Division Achievement Program Coordinator (2010-2019). I was elected as Southern Division Superintendent (2010-2014) termed out, Sunshine Region Secretary (2014-2020), Sunshine Region President (2020-2022), Immediate Past President (Oct 2022-June2023), Director at Large (June 2023- Present 2024. For the past 3 years, I have been involved in the SSR Annual Conventions, as Clinician Chair, finding the Clinicians and Scheduling 32 Clinics for the 2022-2024 SSR Annual Conventions. In 2023-2024, I was also Convention Co-Chair in which my other responsibilities involved getting a speaker for the Banquets, along with searching for a new venue location, for the upcoming 2024 SSR Annual Convention, which will be in Ocala.

I have been involved in the Region since 2008, working with the Board of Directors/Superintendents, to bring new ideas to the "Best Region Under the Sun". I would appreciate your vote to serve another term (2024-2026), as your Sunshine Region, Director at Large.



At Large Director Nominee – Ken Hoot

I am Ken Hoot of Jacksonville Beach, FL, seeking your vote for Sunshine Region Board of Directors at Large Member.

My background includes 23 years in the US Navy, retiring as a Chief (E7). I subsequently worked in technical programs as an instructor guiding young people through mechanical training as they prepared for apprenticeships. In both cases I attempted to nurture a sense of craftsmanship, critical self-analysis, and feedback designed to help the person grow. I feel that this three-pronged approach yields sustained growth and increased work satisfaction. We need to move beyond the mass gatherings and contests as our core activities as these emphasize people with experience and only to a lesser degree the novice member who is looking for guidance and mentoring. We need to expand service to clubs and divisions and encourage both to implement exposure and outreach activities as gateways to the social network that enriches our hobby.

I look forward to the opportunity for service in elected office.



At Large Director Nominee – Robert Leonard

I am Robert Leonard, and most of the membership do not know me personally, but you might know me from my picture that leads the Southern Superintendent report in the Telegraph Key. It has been said the mustache enters the room before I do. I have been the Southern super for the past five years and a member of the NMRA and the SSR for the past 24 years. Most recently you may see my name attached with the title of Editor to the SSR Journal Box. I am running for the position of Director At Large and would appreciate your confidence and vote.

My background in the hobby dates back to the late 1940s, with five family members working for the railroad, my father one of them. Plus, my father used me as an excuse to buy Lionel trains, the interest was there, let's call it destiny, I had no choice. As the interest went on the normal series of life events took place, I got older, got a driver's license, graduated high school, joined the military, and with a marriage, or two, the inevitable hiatus from "trains" took place. At the SFRM I have been an organizer in one way or the other with the 2004 and 2008 SSR regional conventions hosted by the SFRM. With the more recent conventions I have become involved as a clinician, a judge, or a helping hand.

My reason for seeking the position of Director. I see the current leadership moving in a positive and progressive direction, visioning a different outlook for the region, I believe I have something to offer, I want to be part of that. Superintendent Div 1 (North) Nominee – Robert Feuerstein

I am seeking election as a Northern Division Superintendent for the Sunshine Region.

I am a member of the Big Bend Model Railroading Association group in Tallahassee FL, and currently on the NMRA.org Calendar Website Support (link <u>calendar@nmra.org</u>.)

In the past, I was a member of the NMRA and the Short Track Railroad Club in Vista CA since April of 2015 and after a move to Tallahassee Florida in May 2018, am now with Big Bend Model Railroad Association. I have been active in the NMRA since high school which is now almost 50 years. The two things I value most over those years are fellowship and education. I have made many lifelong friends through the NMRA and hope to make many more. Clinics, contests and the Achievement Program have all helped me to become a better modeler.

I have enjoyed meeting many of you at Division Meets and Region Conventions over the last few years. I look forward to meeting more of you and getting to know you better in the coming years. I would like to expand Division Meets into other parts of the Division so more of you can participate. I would also like to encourage active participation in the AP program which will make all of us better modelers.

I hope that together we can continue to help each other improve our skills and share our enjoyment of model railroading.



Superintendent Div 4 (South) Nominee – Richard Berger

Richard has been a model railroader since 1960, when he received a gift of Lionel trains at the age of five. The Lionel trains were sold in the early 1970s to help fund a college education. After graduation and living in a small apartment, Richard returned to the hobby in the late 1970s by purchasing an N scale train.

Richard has continuously collected and run N scale trains since that time, eventually joining Northern Virginia NTRAK (NVNTRAK) when he resided in that area. He also attended a number of national N scale and NMRA conventions around the country, helping to assemble and run on the NTRAK layouts at the convention shows and interfacing with manufacturers to lobby for improved N scale products.

Richard has built multiple layouts in N scale, working in code 55 for years once turnouts were offered. But his current layout uses Kato Unitrak for ease of use and high reliability controlled with a wireless version of the NCE DCC system. Richard's primary interest in the hobby is in railroad operations, and his home layouts have usually consisted of a point-to-loop configuration with a multi-track stub yard and wye for engine terminal operations at one end and a multi-track staging loop at the opposite end.

Beyond modeling, Richard has been an avid and active member of the Union Pacific Historical Society (UPHS) for decades even though he has always lived on the East coast. It was the Union Pacific railroad's decision to never retire the FEF #844 steam locomotive that drove his decision and he has never regretted it. Richard has visited the steam restoration and maintenance facility in Cheyenne, Wyoming and was privileged to ride on a UP steam excursion with both the 844 FEF and 4014 Big Boy in 2019 following his attendance at the 150th anniversary of the completion of the transcontinental railroad at Promontory, Utah.

Richard has ridden on many other trains over the years, both on historical excursions and modern transportation in the US and other countries. In 2023, he rode the privately owned and operated Rocky Mountaineer through the Colorado Rockies and also the famous Grand Canyon train. Earlier in 2024, Richard traveled to Orlando, Florida on the newly initiated Brightline high-speed rail service.

Richard has been a member of the board of the South Florida Railway Museum (SFRM) since 2023, having joined the group in 2022. He also leads efforts to maintain and enhance the club's N scale layout and has organized several evening operating sessions on the club layout. Richard also organizes the club's annual home layout tours which occur during April-June.

Rails of the Caribbean: An Occasional Travelogue

The railroads of Florida have been the subject of thorough documentation across the years. Yet what about the railways – past and present – of the neighboring Caribbean? The subject caught my interest earlier this year when my wife and I embarked on an

extended cruise throughout the Caribbean. Enroute to our ultimate destination of Manaus on Brazil's mighty Amazon River, the cruise included stops at many island nations. Some had operating railways at one time or another, others not.

I decided to focus on Aruba for three reasons: 1) considerable longevity of operations, 2) private rather than government-driven development, and 3) economic impact, both internal and external.

Railway history on Aruba can be traced back to 1850. Although there were occasional breaks in operations, some activity continued until the late 1950s, essentially a century of operations. And across this considerable timeframe, three distinct commodities were transported: gold, phosphate, and oil.

Gold was discovered on Aruba in 1824. Across the next 75 years, estimates suggest more than three million pounds of gold were produced. While a handful of smaller mining sites existed, for railway enthusiasts, the Balashi Gold Mill at the Spanish Lagoon is of greatest interest. Balashi (Papiamento for "near the sea") is where the Aruba Gold Concessions Company constructed a gold smelter in 1899. Today, guided as well as independent tours of the mine site are possible.

In 1901, the Aruba Gold Mining Co. Ltd. (London) secured a concession for gold mining on Aruba. Soon thereafter, the AGM built a man-powered, narrow gauge underground railway to support extraction of the valuable mineral. Soon thereafter, a smelter to process the ore was built midway between Sint Nicolaas and Oranjestad. The initial trackage, linking the smelter site with Oranjestad is believed to have been 24-inch gauge light rail. In 1881, a steam traction engine was imported to Aruba.

Gold mining operations were turned over to Aruba Gold Concessions Ltd. In 1901. Mining operations ceased in 1914, in large part due to the inability to obtain explosives, cyanide (required for the ore smelting process), and other supplies (including spare parts for the mine and smelter). The outbreak of the First World War in effect ended gold mining, as Germany was an important source of many of the required items.

Phosphate deposits (guano) were discovered in 1874 at Cerroe Colorado, near the southeast tip of Aruba. Five years hence, the Aruba Phosphate Co was founded. The APC funded the construction of a large L-shaped steel pier in 1890 at Sint Nicolaas. A 30-inch gauge railway was constructed linking the mines with the pier. A steam tug was purchased to assist with ship docking operations.

By the end of 1881, seven kilometers of railway served mines located at Cerroe Colorado and Cerro Culebra. Two small English-built steam locomotives were acquired, each capable of hauling 10 to 12 loaded tipping cars. The mine's operations continued to flourish, reaching daily production of 300 tons. In 1882, a 0-4-0T locomotive was purchased from HL Porter. This latest motive power was capable of hauling 30 loaded cars. Ultimately the APC would own 91 tipping cars as well as a single-axle inspection car.

Given the discovery of phosphate in the U.S. (chiefly in Florida), demand for the Aruban product declined significantly by the end of the 1880s. Exacerbating the situation was the outbreak of the First World War which disrupted ocean-going shipping operations. The mines would ultimately close; and the tracks, locos, and rolling stock abandoned. By the mid-1930s, the locos had been pushed into a mine pit (Cerroe Culebra) and covered with trash. In 1915, Shell Oil purchased rail steel and tipping cars to support construction of a refinery site.

Will continue with an overview of the "petroleum period" on Aruba if there's reader interest.

Epilogue

A popular aspect of layout planning includes the "island" approach. Visible trackage consumes the space available, and "beyond the layout" operation or interchange is left to the imagination. Railway operations on Aruba reflect this design and operation rather nicely. Further, the century-long operating window provides an opportunity to employ a variety of motive power and rolling stock options. Scratch-build if you're wedded to historic fidelity, "proto freelance" if your "modeling margins" are wider.





Hands-On Clinics

Clinic attendees, if you have a favorite weathering media, bring it to share your knowledge of your technique. If you want to bring some rolling stock or structures to weather, please do.

<u>Soldering for Beginners</u> – Clinician: Allison Dendy – $3\frac{1}{2}$ Hours – Cost \$20 - Class is limited to 18 Students - Clinic will be Saturday morning, October 12^{th} , 8:15 – 11:45AM. (If Soldering Projects not completed, the class will continue at 1PM) –

Hesitant about attempting an electronics project? Then this is the course for you. After a *brief* lecture overview, I will personally guide you from how to turn the iron on to tackling any model railroad soldering task with The Telegraph Key August 2024

confidence. This is a practical course with the attention you deserve to assure that you leave with the skills you need. We tried in a test run of this clinic, and found the digital soldering stations did not work very well.

I will furnish each attendee with enough material to build over 30 trees in the workshop. Also, I will have 3 of my plastic flocking bottles along with all the flocking that is needed to furnish the trees.

<u>Pursuing Merit AP Certificates</u> – Clinician: Richard Segall – 2 Hours – NO COST – Attendees: 20 Max

The NMRA Achievement Program offers terrific guidance for quality modeling. It is a process that empowers modelers to improve.

This Hands-On clinic will address the characteristics of good modeling and remove much of the mystery from the model evaluation process. Group collaborations will look for common mistakes and omissions. Together, we will explore strategies to elevate scores to maximize current abilities.

This clinic will cover the basics of module construction, including materials, tools, and techniques.

To, a niche facet of model railroading that belies the fact that model railroading is affordable, but where else are you going to find it? From listening to collectors that swore if you painted it, you lost the investment, too, if it not painted, it is not worthy of collecting, and everything in between.

Tuscarora Operations – Clinician: Robert Raymond

Operator Robert Raymond (designer of the *Tuscarora Branch Line*) gives ideas and tips on how to build your dream layout in a small and manageable area. The Tuscarora shows how much N-scale railroad operations you can pack into a 2x4 foot space. Set in Pennsylvania in 1962, we can accommodate five operators (scheduled freight and local engineer, coal operations, an interlocking lever operator, a station agent and a dispatcher). US Steel had 2 Steel Mills and Coke Operations around the Pittsburg area. 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
