As we approach October, I am thrilled to reflect on the past 10 months since I took office. It has been an incredible journey, and I am grateful for the support and enthusiasm from all of you.


The Convention is just around the corner, and I am excited to announce that we are already breaking previous records for attendance! This is a testament to the vibrant and engaged community we have built together.





On the workbench

As I shared in an earlier *Telegraph Key* column, am presently developing an HO scale industrial-theme shelf layout inspired by John Wright's Federal Street track plan (*Model Railroader*, May 2003). John's layout drew upon the Pennsylvania Railroad's one-time Whitehall Branch, a five-mile branch located along the south bank of the Monongahela River in a neighborhood known as Southside Flats. The branch included a variety of online customers, many of which reflected the heavy industries characteristic of mid-20th century Pittsburgh.

Given the shelf character, the proposed layout will feature numerous low-relief industries across the 15-foot "backdrop", including a compressed depiction of the Jones & Laughlin Steel plant. Deciding on a suitable stand-in for the J&L Steel plant presented a challenge. Initially considered using one or more kits from Walthers' popular "Steel" series. However, kit availability is limited and the available backdrop space (i.e., depth) does not translate well. Next, I considered Plastruct's Steel Mill (Kit #1030) and Sinter Plant (Kit #1031). While the Steel Mill's low-relief (three inches) could be a good fit, given so many competing layout priorities, I decided to pass (at least for now).

What turned out to be a solution (at least on a temporary basis) was suggested by my friend John Teichmoeller. John's home layout features a substantial steel-making component, and he's a long-time member of the Steel Mill Modeler's SIG. John suggested Clever Models which offers a broad selection of industrial and commercial paper models in HO and O scales. The American Steel Pipe Co. (Kit S43) is 68'-4" wide, 7'-4" deep, and 50'-0" high; a good (perhaps temporary) fit given the available real estate. Depending upon how the final track plan plays out, Clever Models also offers a Big Steel Mill Building (Kit S29) and a Small Steel Mill Building (Kit S30).

Paper and cardstock models are fairly commonplace among British and European model railroaders. The structure is provided as a full-color downloadable file in full HO scale. The link is temporary, so I saved the file to my Desktop. To obtain quality resolution, I decided to email the file to my local FedEx/Kinko's for printing on matte finish cardstock in 8.5 x 14-inch format.

Using a series of fresh Xacto #11 blades and a steel rule, I cut out the main façade and roof pieces. The façade features a large steel roll-up door at each end of the front elevation, and full-width series of windows. To enhance the single-dimensional appearance of the front elevation, Clever Models suggests cutting out the roll-up doors (and perhaps the small personnel door, as well), and adding bit of trim to simulate depth. Some modelers may also elect to cut out the full-width window and substitute clear styrene with appropriate mullions.

Once the façade was cut out, I decided to strengthen the structure by gluing pieces of foamcore to the interior surface. This proved particularly important for each of the side walls. To facilitate bending, lightly score the inside front and side wall joints.

Additional details such as recessed vents and appropriate piping can add to the overall appearance of the model. I chose to cover one of the large roll-up doors using spare pieces of corrugated siding provided with the kit.

My purchase of the American Steel Pipe kit was a first for me; and in retrospect, a pleasurable modeling experience.

Postscript to Sept 2024 column

Last month I shared some thoughts regarding modeling a pair of ACF 70-ton "first generation" covered hoppers. While the plan was to decal the models as L&NE cement cars, some roster photos of Shippers Car Line LO's caught my eye.

Established in 1917 as a tank car leasing company, SHPX was acquired by American Car & Foundry in 1927. The SHPX reporting marks were used until 1968, when they were replaced by ACFX.

Fortunately, Microscale Decals offers a nice set of HO scale decals (87-660) for ACF 70T LO's (Private Cars 1939-70). Contained therein is artwork for ten possible cars including two for SHPX. Microscale's roster lists three SHPX series covering 1947 and 1948.

Next step: Create appropriate waybills for these latest fleet additions.

The East Coast HO Exhibitors Society (ECHOES) is planning an SSR divisional meet and workshop on November 2nd, with a layout running session November 2nd-3rd at the Cornerstone Methodist Church. It's located at 20740 Old Cutler Road, Cutler Bay, FL 33189. The meet on Saturday opens at 8 AM for registration. The registration fee of \$20 includes attendance at the clinics, lunch, donuts and coffee in the morning, and a single raffle ticket (you can purchase additional raffle tickets separately). If you pre-register via email, you will receive a free 2nd raffle ticket. There are two parallel clinic tracks planned 9:15-11:45 AM: one is focused on Tsunami DCC decoders, and the other combines sessions on backdrop painting and operations with JMRI. All division members as well as non-NMRA members are welcome to attend.

Starting at 1:15 PM on Saturday, an operating session will begin on the ECHOES modular HO scale layout. The layout is DCC using the Digitrax system. You are welcome to bring your own Digitrax throttle, or you may use one of several club throttles. The Digitrax system supports wireless operation with duplex throttles. At 4 PM, the layout will be opened for free running with a "to be determined" end time. On Sunday, open running will begin at 9 AM with an operating session from 1-4 PM.

In upcoming events, the SFRM annual Train Show at the St. Paul Lutheran Church at 701 West Palmetto Park Road, Boca Raton FL 33486 is scheduled for Saturday, November 23rd. Hours will be 9 AM through 2 PM with \$8 admission for adults and free admission for children up through 12 years old.




Convention Hotel - Hilton Ocala

Convention Clinics

We listened to our survey responses at last year's convention and one item that stood out was handson clinics. We hope to meet your expectation with how to subjects on weathering, tree making, T-TRAK assembly, op sessions and more.

Hands-On Clinics

<u>Weathering with the (non) Masters</u> – Clinicians: Bill Cialini, Tim Ellis, and Bob Leonard – $3\frac{1}{2}$ Hours – Cost \$20 – Class is limited to 20 Students - Clinic will be Friday afternoon, October 11th, 1PM – 4:30PM.

This clinic will cover weathering three of the primary mediums used in weathering all of our toys, whether those toys are on the rails, or alongside of them. There are three clinicians that will teach their approach to weathering, Gouache paint, Pastels / Powders and Watercolor Pencils. We can't teach airbrush techniques and practices because no one wants a smelly room!

All who attend will have the opportunity to employ these techniques as you follow along. There will be pre-primed boxcar shells, that will be distributed for your use to practice what you have been taught. Clinic attendees, if you have a favorite weathering media, bring it to share your knowledge of your technique. If you want to bring some rolling stock or structures to weather, please do.

<u>Soldering for Beginners</u> – Clinician: Allison Dendy – 3 ½ Hours – Cost \$20 - Class is limited to 18 Students - Clinic will be Saturday morning, October 12th, 8:15 – 11:45AM. (If Soldering Projects not completed, the class will continue at 1PM) –

Would you like to learn how to solder? Are you frustrated trying to solder feeders to track without melting ties? Are you not satisfied with your wiring connections? Hesitant about attempting an electronics project? Then this is the course for you. After a *brief* lecture overview, I will personally guide you from how to turn the iron on to tackling any model railroad soldering task with

confidence. This is a practical course with the attention you deserve to assure that you leave with the skills you need. A comprehensive, progressive list of soldering tasks will be taught with each student performing the work with as much personal guidance and attention as may be required, culminating in the student completing an electronics project to show off to your friends.

Learn to Solder Practice Kit

This kit is ideal for beginners. It has all the necessary electronic components (but no tools) to build a working circuit. Dive into hands-on learning as you assemble a European siren with flashing lights on a cutting-edge printed circuit board. This project not only teaches basic soldering techniques but also provides insight into circuit functionality. The solder practice kit includes a detailed lesson manual, making it a perfect educational tool for creating an intruder alarm, bicycle siren, or an eye-catching attention-getter.

Along with instruction on how to solder feeders to rail, cable to connectors, surface-mount resistors to PC cards, and making wire splices, this kit rounds out the learning curricula for this practical clinic so that students will have the skills and confidence to manage their model railroad soldering tasks.

Requirements: Preferably a stick soldering iron with a fine point tip, Rosin Core Solder, needle nose plyers, a small wire cutter, a wire stripper, Helping Hands to hold soldering items, and magnifiers if you have them. We tried in a test run of this clinic, and found the digital soldering stations did not work very well.

This hands-on clinic is designed for model railroad enthusiasts interested in learning how to build a T-TRAK module. T-TRAK is a modular system that allows modelers to create small, portable modules that can be connected with others to form a larger layout. This clinic will cover the basics of module construction, including materials, tools, and techniques.

Agenda:

1. Introduction to T-TRAK Modules (15 minutes)

- Brief history and concept of T-TRAK.
- Advantages of T-TRAK modules: portability, ease of construction, and community building.
- Overview of module standards and specifications.

2. Materials and Tools (20 minutes)

- o List of necessary materials: wood, foam, track, wiring, scenery supplies.
- o Recommended tools: saw, drill, screwdriver, soldering iron, glue gun.

- Basic wiring techniques: power feeders, bus wires, connectors.
- Testing the track and wiring for smooth operation.

5. Scenery Basics (30 minutes)

- Planning the scenic elements: terrain, buildings, vegetation.
- Applying basic scenery techniques: ground cover, trees, roads.
- Tips for realistic scenery and detailing.

6. Finishing Touches and Troubleshooting (20 minutes)

- Adding final details: figures, vehicles, signage.
- o Common issues and how to fix them.
- Maintenance tips for keeping your module in top condition.

7. Q&A and Hands-On Assistance (30 minutes)

The Ubiquitous F Unit - Clinician: Bob Leonard

The clinic describes the changes over the years of the (Bulldog) nosed design of EMC-EMD F units, from the 1940s to the 1980s. The emphasis is on the 1st generation of units built and the models that have been produced from the many manufacturers, FTs to F7s. Everyone has done an F unit, pot metal, brass, plastic, they are like "Big Boys" if you have seen one, you have seen them all. Not true!

A Short History of Brass - Clinician: Bob Handin

A brief history, from the introduction of brass models after WWII, crude, sometimes un-running, but where else are you going to find it? To, a niche facet of model railroading that belies the fact that model railroading is affordable, but where else are you going to find it? From listening to collectors that swore if you painted it, you lost the investment, too, if it not painted, it is not worthy of collecting, and everything in between.

<u>Tuscarora Operations</u> – Clinician: Robert Raymond

Operator Robert Raymond (designer of the *Tuscarora Branch Line*) gives ideas and tips on how to build your dream layout in a small and manageable area. The Tuscarora shows how much N-scale railroad operations you can pack into a 2x4 foot space. Set in Pennsylvania in 1962, we can accommodate five operators (scheduled freight and local engineer, coal operations, an interlocking lever operator, a station agent and a dispatcher). Ops in Tight Spaces - Clinician: Robert Raymond

Even if you only have a friend or two or a small space, you *can* still operate. Robert will have the Tuscarora Layout for Operations in the Hilton Ballroom.

Florida Early Orange Production - Clinician: Tom Wilson

In Central Florida, Transportation, Plants, Byproducts, to modern Production and what you did not know what is made from oranges.

How to detail your Steel Mills and Coke Ovens - Clinician: Tom Wilson

Tom models in HO Scale the Pittsburg& West Virginia Railroad and the Union Railroad. The Union Railroad (a subsidiary of US Steel) around the Pittsburg area. US Steel had 2 Steel Mills and Coke Operations around the Pittsburg area. Tom worked for US Steel for 20 years and will show you how to correctly model steel mills and coke operations, from someone that actually worked in the mills.

Basic Switching Techniques - Clinician: Donovan Lewis

Athearn Blue Box Conversion to DCC - Clinician: Howard Goodwin, MMR

In this clinic, you will learn the steps to convert your older Athearn Blue Box locomotives to DCC from Howard Goodwin, MMR. Follow along as we take the Athearn loco from its basic state of DC to the completion of a DCC installation and a modern up to date locomotive. Learn as well how to prepare for the decoder install and construction of the motor "saddle" on which your decoder will sit. 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
