



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

Treasurer's Message



Hello Everyone,

Merry Christmas, Happy Holidays to all!!

I wanted to take this opportunity to share with our members what it takes financially to run the Sunshine Region annually.

We create a rough budget going out three years to help identify all income and expenses that will befall us and to ensure we have the cash to support this.

We derive income from 5 sources: 1) interest from the bank on our holdings in the form of CD's and a Money Market account, 2) our biannual stipend from the NMRA, 3) any monies from division meets or convention, 4) donations and 5) advertising.

On the expense side of things, we pay for insurance, website, postage, AP Awards, office supplies, software and equipment (laptops, projectors, screens and their repair or replacement), legal fees to the State, and expenses related to division meets/convention.

In round numbers it costs the Region about \$3000 a year to operate. We receive \$850 from the NMRA, \$1000 from advertising, \$1000 from bank interest, \$400 from division meets, and \$1000 in donations for 2024. Sounds good right? \$4000 in, 3000 out, we still have cash left. However, interest rates are falling, and our donations can't be expected to occur with any consistency, if at all. Take away our donations and a reduction in interest rates and we run short of cash to pay our bills. Sure, we can draw down our cash reserves to pay shortfalls or if we need a new laptop or projector or we spent money on a convention that didn't happen but that reduces future interest on our holdings.

But it's not all doom and gloom folks, I'm just pointing out as everyone knows, things are getting more expensive. We all feel it in our savings and our own monthly bills. As an organization we cannot guarantee interest rates, donations or monies from the NMRA. But we can work on increasing our

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advertising in the Telegraph Key, Journal Box and Timetable. If we all worked together to get our local hobby stores (or national ones) and clubs to place an ad with us we would be in sound fiscal condition for years to come.

Let me close with some of my thoughts. My goal is not to grow the treasury of the SSR by more than \$1 dollar year over year. Let's bring in the cash we need to meet our bills in any given year with any overage used to reduce the cost of the convention which, in turn, reduces your cost to attend. I ask that everyone try to sell an ad – a business card ad is only \$50 for the entire year, other ad sizes slightly more expensive (pricing is on our website). I plan on listing 2024 financials in our February 2025 Telegraph Key. If anyone has any questions, please email me.

Achievement Program



So, let's talk about the route to Master Model Railroader. Number one there are eleven (11) different APs in the program and they are divided up into four (4) different groups and you need at least one AP from each group plus three (3) from any of the other groups for a total of seven (7) to become a Master Model Railroader.

The Groups are:

#1 Railroad Equipment

- Master Builder Motive Power
- Master Builder Cars

#2 Railroad Setting

- Master Builder Structures
- Master builder Scenery
- Master Builder Models

#3 Railroad Construction and Operation

- Model Railroad Engineer Civil
- Model Railroad Engineer Electrical
- Chief Dispatcher

#4 Service to The Hobby and NMRA

- Association Official
- Association Volunteer
- Model Railroad Author

So now let's talk about The Statement of Qualifications for Master Builder Motive Power. To qualify for this certificate, you must:

#1 Build three (3) scale models of a railroad motive power, one (1) of which must be scratchbuilt. Motive Power is defined as a locomotive or a self-propelled vehicle. To qualify as scratchbuilt, the motive power must contain all of the following scratchbuilt items as applicable:

- Steam Locomotive: frame and boiler and cab; tender frame and body; and either valve gear or min and side driving rods.
- Other Motive Power: body and frame and cab/hood; power truck side frame; and pantograph or trolley poles where appropriate.

All models must be capable of self-propulsion on track of the same gauge as the model. Power trains for all models may be commercial motors and gears. All models must be super detailed either with scratchbuilt parts or with commercial parts as defined in the AP Regulations "DEFINITIONS' section

#2 Earn a Merit Award with each of the three (3) scale models of motive power via an NMRA sponsored model contest or AP Merit Award Evaluation.

#3 Submit a completed Statement of Qualifications (SOQ) which shall include the following for each model:

- Attachment giving detail descriptions of each of the models.
 - Identification of the scratchbuilt features for each of the models.
 - List all the commercial components appearing on the models.
 - List the materials used in building each of the models.
- Verification of the Merit Awards copies of the evaluation's sheets or the Merit Award sheets.

Next month we will cover the Statement of Qualifications for Achievement Program Cars. That is all I have for this time.

Getting started with Operations

There are probably as many ways to operate a model railroad layout as there are model railroaders. Some like to run long trains, be they passenger or freight. Others will run trains using a schedule or timetable, stopping at various waypoints along the line to drop off or pick up various cars. And further still, there is a growing contingent who operate in as prototypical a manner as their knowledge and enthusiasm allows. In some instances, these prototypical operations involve a sizeable layout with multiple towns, stations, and industries. By contrast, some layouts many be more modest, perhaps even confined to a relatively small shelf trackplan with the focus on switching a handful of online customers.

As I have shared in prior columns, am presently constructing a 15-linear foot industrial-theme shelf layout inspired by a former PRR branch across the Monongahela River from downtown Pittsburgh PA. My nascent layout features 12 online customers and a small interchange yard. Connections with the larger railway universe occurs "off the layout". Although driving of the golden spike lies in the distant future, brainstorming re how best to operate this "bedroom empire" competes with the building, painting, and weathering scores of freight cars.

Literally volumes have been written on model railroading operations, some scholarly other intended to get the budding rail operator up and running as soon as practical. In pursuing this interest, I have discovered four resources to be especially helpful.

First, after joining the NMRA, one of my next investments was membership with the Operations Special Interest Group (OPSIG). This has provided several benefits including a quarterly newsletter (*The Dispatcher's Office*), online discussion group, and an online listing of actual (past and present) railroad industries (customers) segregated by geographic region.

OPSIG members also enjoy access to a large collection of *DO* back issues, something which has benefited me greatly as I strive to increase my understanding of waybills and car forwarding. Two articles by noted SP modeler Tony Thompson (MMR) stand out: "Freight Car Handling and Distribution" (October 2011) and "Contents of a Waybill" (April 2010).

Second, given my focus on the PRR in the late 1940s, securing a listing of stations, sidings, and online customers was important. The PRR produced such a document (CT 1000); initially annually, and then less frequently after 1918. The last two editions were released in 1923 and 1945. A Google search will reveal various regional, line, or branch extracts online as well as full editions via railway ephemera dealers.

Third, *Tom's 1938 Register* (Thomas A. Gloger, 2001) This 250-page, coil bound book contain a listing of companies (consumers and producers) categorized by product type. Example: "Food Ingredients: Standard Brands, Inc. (Peekskill NY). Yeast, alcohol, and other products. Employes 2,500. RR: NYC". Have found this to be very useful in preparing waybills for both inbound and outbound traffic.

Fourth, over the last fifteen years or so, *Model Railroader*'s Jeff Wilson authored a series of softcover books, each focusing on a specific industry or commodity. Published by Kalmbach Books, titles in the series include piggyback and container traffic; express, mail, and merchandise service; produce, and milk. Each volume typically includes an overview of the industry or commodity (as it relates to movement by rail), discussion of rolling stock and owners, insights into day-to-day operations, and discussion of customers and facilities.

We've all heard of Rule 1: "It's my railway.....". And while true, suspect many layout owners would also agree having a "reason for being" (albeit sufficiently flexible to reflect the current priorities of the brass hat) can add an element of purpose. After all, those online customers exist for a reason: the reliable movement of inbound materials and finished goods to and from their respective "loading dock".

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
